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




These majestic lectures speak of the threefold human being – of body (head, heart and hands), soul (thinking, feeling and will), and spirit (waking, dreaming and sleeping). Such holistic concepts challenge the acute dangers of polarisation, of twofoldness – being bound to the earth through dead thought on

the one hand (the ahrimanic) and taken up into states of fantasy on the other (the luciferic). The challenge, says Rudolf Steiner, is always to see the intermediary or balancing force, the Christ being, in every context.

Steiner refers to the conclusions of the Ecumenical Council of 869 AD, that human beings consist only of body and soul. Now, he says, we are entering a period where even the soul is denied in favour of the physical brain. In contrast, he presents a vision of evolving humanity in the broader context of a cosmos that reaches to realms of existence beyond even space and time.

Rudolf Steiner's lucid account of our current phase of evolution focuses on the threefold human being and the significance of incarnation on Earth. In a nuanced presentation, he supports the modern scientific outlook but highlights the urgent need to broaden it, emphasizing the importance of balance in thinking, feeling and will. Withdrawing

into abstract intellectualism while letting feeling and will run amok, leads to unconscious egotism and, ultimately, the War of All Against All. In place of nebulous mysticism or narrow materialism, Steiner calls on us to bring our thoughts, feelings and actions under conscious self-control so that – for our benefit and society as a whole – we can live our lives with clarity, far-sightedness and purpose.

Intrinsic to this reassessment of ourselves and our place in the universe is a recognition of death as a gateway to continuing existence. Only by acknowledging our journey into the afterlife and our return to earth (reincarnation) will we take charge of a truly human evolution.



After leaving the Church in 1987, he became a freelance speaker and author of numerous books. From 2004 until his death, he

co-founded a publishing company, Rudolf Steiner Ausgaben.

Friedrich Rittelmeyer (1872-1938) – a well-known Protestant preacher of his day who helped found The Christian Community – presents us with the modern seeker's path. On the way, Nietzsche's trenchant critique of Christianity is answered as intellectual honesty demands – with a concrete account of spiritual experience.



FRIEDRICH RITTELMEYER (1872–1938) was a Lutheran minister and theologian who led the founding of The Christian Community. From the 1910s his thinking was gradually influenced by the spiritual researcher Rudolf Steiner. In 1922 a group of mainly Lutheran pastors and theology students founded The Christian Community, a Movement for Religious Renewal. Rittelmeyer remained at the helm

of the movement until his death.







This is one of many astonishing statements made by Rudolf Steiner in this collection on the inner realities of music. They are supplemented by two question-and-answer sessions and two short addresses.

In the first group of four lectures, given in 1906, Steiner explains why music affects the human soul so powerfully. Music has always held a special position among the arts because it is the only art form whose


archetype, or source, lies not in the physical world, as with architecture, sculpture and painting, but purely in the spiritual world – the soul's true home. Music thus directly expresses through tones the innermost essence of the cosmos. Our sense of wellbeing when we hear music comes from a recognition of our soul's experience in the spiritual world.

In the later lectures and addresses, given between 1920 and 1923, Steiner discusses our experience of musical intervals and shows how it has undergone profound changes during the course of evolution. The religious effects of music in ancient times and the union of music with speech are considered, as well as the origin of musical instruments out of imaginations that accompanied singing. New insights are offered on the nature of the major and minor modes and on future directions of musical development.

This book is a brilliant and inspiring companion for anyone seeking deeper insight into the mystery of music. It features colour reproductions of four of Rudolf Steiner's blackboard drawings.


Every external event has a counterpart in the spiritual world, and what is true on the physical plane often looks very different on the spiritual plane. There, spiritual beings are active in the unfolding of destiny. Thus an event may intervene in the course of earthly life with the iron law of necessity and at the same time, on a higher level, create the possibility for free

action. A tragedy on the physical plane – e.g. the death of a group of people in a car accident – may be experienced by the souls of the victims as a source of great joy across the threshold because they have received a new and important task in the spiritual world.

Nature was once a free deed of the gods, and the past thoughts of the gods appear to us as necessity. So, too, will our present life of thought become the future world of outer nature. In the future, the world will look bleaker and the will will have less strength. Spiritual science will then reawaken consciousness of the human aura, bring about a strengthening of will, and enable a truthful understanding of past lives. Spiritual science is now necessary as an evolutionary development, and yet we can only take it up in freedom.

Other subjects covered in the lectures include: the workings of Ahriman and Lucifer, Faust as an evolutionary factor independent of Goethe, the historical conflict of the Roman world and the Teutonic tribes, and the importance of viewing historical events in light of intentions rather than results.



first pupil in 1950, and together they founded a painting school at the Goetheanum, Switzerland. Gerard Wagner died in 1999, leaving a legacy of more than 4,000 images.

The most well-known, even obvious, of these are the roughly seven-year rhythms of early childhood and adolescence, culminating in the transition to adulthood around the age of twenty-one.

But this and other archetypal rhythms continue to unfold throughout life, perhaps more subtly and certainly in the most differentiated and individualized of ways. These have often been explored, especially as they pertain to the 'active years' of adulthood. But less has been written about the so-called elder years. This volume seeks to remedy that.



This third edition features a thoroughly revised and extended Preface, Introduction and auxiliary chapters – updated out of the signs of the present time.



The universal scholar Hermann Beckh (1875-1937), Orientalist and Christian priest, 'carried in his soul love for the Word, love for the stars, and love for music'. 

HERMANN BECKH (1875-1937) studied Law and later Sanskrit, becoming Professor of Oriental Studies at the University of Berlin. A master of ancient and modern languages, he wrote extensively on religious and philosophical subjects, including Buddhism, Indology, Christianity, Alchemy and Music. In 1911 he heard a lecture by Rudolf Steiner and was inspired to join the Anthroposophical Society,

where he soon became a valued co-worker. In 1922, he helped found The Christian Community, a movement for religious renewal. His many books have now been translated from the original German and published in English.
